

Types of Eligible Expenditures Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund (HEERF)

The Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund (**HEERF**) program includes three funds (HEERF I, HEERF II, and HEERF III) delivering more than \$74 billion to institutions of Higher Education (**IHEs**) across the country to support their response to and recovery from the COVID-19 public health emergency.

Institutions generally must expend their HEERF grant funds within one year from the date when the Department of Education processed the most recent obligation of funds for each specific grant. In other words, institutions that received a supplemental award under HEERF III have one year from the date of the HEERF III award to expend all remaining HEERF I, HEERF II, and HEERF III funds. No-cost extensions of up to 12 months are available as provided for in <u>2 CFR § 200.308(e)(2)</u>.

Guidance relating to the expenditures of these funds is included in the U.S. Department of Education's i) <u>Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund III Frequently Asked Ouestions</u>, ii) <u>Using Higher Education</u> <u>Emergency Relief Fund (HEERF) Institutional Portion Grant Funds to Meet the Basic Needs of Students</u>, and iii) <u>Federal Register Notice</u>. The HEERF spending parameters directly support impacted students and the institutions which they attend. Pursuant to the CARES Act and the American Rescue Plan Act, IHEs are required to allocate no less than 50%* of HEERF I & III dollars to providing students with grants that may be used for any component of their cost of attendance and/or to help offset emergency costs associated with the coronavirus pandemic. Per the requirements established in the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act (**CRRSA**), institutions receiving HEERF II dollars must allocate the same dollar amount to student financial support they allocated with HEERF I funds.

*For-profit institutions are required to allocate 100% of HEERF dollars to student grants.

All funds not allocated to direct student financial support are to be expended by recipients for institutional uses with the express purpose of defraying coronavirus-related expenses, including lost revenue, reimbursement for expenses already incurred, technology costs associated with a transition to distance education, faculty and staff trainings, and payroll.

Minor Remodeling as defined in <u>34 CFR § 77.1</u>	 Installation or renovation of an HVAC system to help with air filtration to prevent the spread of COVID-19 Purchase or lease of temporary trailer classroom units to increase social distancing Purchase and installation of "room dividers" within a previously completed building to increase social distancing Expansion of on-campus childcare centers Extension of utility lines, such as water & electricity
